

Potted History
Of
Ingleburn R.S.L Memorial

The original Memorial in Memorial Avenue Ingleburn dated back to 1930 when the Council handed over the area to the R.S.L Sub-Branch. An Obilisk was built from bricks acqiured from a demolished Church of England which stood on the corner of Cumberland and Minto roads. A brick fence and wrought iron gates were erected and it was officially opened by Major General Sir Charles Rosenthal on the 25 October 1931. Anzac Day Services were held there until late 1970 when a bridge was erected over the rail line in Ingleburn. A small memorial was erected in front of the new club which was used until an Obilisk and new memorial walls were erected, the bricks in the Obilisk are from the original one. In the mid 1980 the new memorial was opened, since then there have been additions made, a memorial pond and fountain, benches for people to sit and meditate, two saplings have been planted which were propagated from the original Lone Pine at Gallipoli.
